



# Anti-forestry groups are costing Thurston County taxpayers millions. Vital county services will be lost, or your taxes will be raised.

**As much as \$4.4 million in non-tax revenues are held up by current pauses on trustland timber sales in Thurston County.**

## When DNR puts politics ahead of science, local communities pay the price:

- Taxpayers in the Olympia School District will need to make up *at least* \$1.2 million in missing non-tax revenue. Tumwater School District will need to find \$870,577.
- Thurston County is losing out on \$832,707 in funding to maintain current general fund and road services -- every taxpayer in the county could be on the hook.
- Timberland Regional Library will lose \$119,642 unless taxes are raised.
- Medic One is due \$166,018 that could be used to meet demands for critical emergency services.
- Higher taxes to maintain the Port of Olympia and PUD are also possible.

## And Ecology's stream rule ("Np") will cause even more harm.

The Np rule will permanently reduce the timber excise tax revenue that Thurston County relies on—a **loss estimated at \$1.8 million annually**. This will directly reduce funding for schools, roads and local services.
